Arlene Blum, biophysical chemist, author, and mountaineer has led successful first women’s expeditions to Annapurna I and Denali, and walked 2000 miles across the Great Himalaya mountain range of Bhutan, Nepal, & India. MASS CASUALTY

With the restrictions imposed by SARS-COV-2, several institutions have canceled conferences, medical student rotations, and other forms of in-person wilderness medical education. As educators attempt to transition their content for remote instruction, the outdoors components of wilderness medicine courses could prove particularly challenging. Virtual adaptations could potentially reduce cost and logistical requirements while still conveying high-value wilderness medicine concepts. Our instructors will share their first-hand tips and tricks of converting the WMS jointly sponsored BreckWild wilderness and environmental medicine student elective (originally a 4-week course scheduled for Breckenridge, CO, in April, but cancelled due to COVID-19) to a virtual format focused on telemedicine. They will explain how doing so can take advantage of the virtual platform while emphasizing disaster medicine, in the context of current events. Our innovative instructors attempted adaptations of multiple types of simulation and interactive education. Their efforts at translating a mass casualty simulation were particularly well-received by the 30 students who participated in the virtual student elective. This MCI simulation included a tabletop exercise for the incident command system (ICS) and rigorous game rules for the field. The webinar explores both their redesigned curricular framework and experience with the virtual simulation itself. Our hope is that you can learn their pearls and pitfalls as you design your own future virtual courses.

Diploma in Mountain Medicine (DiMM) - \$1,650



Wednesday, February 17-18; 8:00 AM - 5:00 PM

This conference is designed in conjunction with the DiMM program. The DiMM is intended as continuing education for doctors, nurses, and paramedics who work in or aspire to work in austere mountain environments. The required coursework is an ideal blend of didactic and practical education in wilderness medicine, technical rescue, and self-sufficiency in the backcountry. This skill set crosses a multitude of disciplines including expedition medicine, search and rescue operations, mountain guiding, ski patrol, and mountain recreationalists. Topics in this pre-conference include hypothermia, improvised rescue, exercise physiology, pediatric wilderness medicine, medical problems in remote areas, snow shelters, and more. The Winter WMS DiMM session will be a complete DiMM session that is facilitated through a virtual environment. Activities and skills will be managed with some required pre-recorded lectures and activities prior to the synchronous virtual event. In the end all ICAR requirements will be met and the virtual session will stand alone and not require any skills make-up.

The avalanche course will not be offered in conjunction with this conference. Participants are required to get a Level 1 Avalanche certification (at their own expense) in the winter of 2020-21 or 2021-22 (before 4/2022). Criteria to opt out of the avalanche course requirement (proof of prior training and experience) remain unchanged.

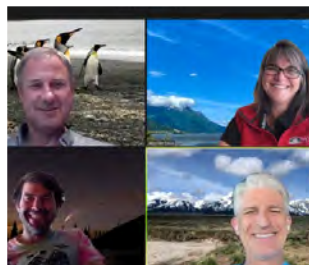
